

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Our Education Crisis:

Did you know?*

By 4th grade, **83%** of low-income students are **not reading proficiently**.

6.6 million low-income children born between 2002-2010 will be at increased **risk of failing to graduate** from high school because of lack of reading proficiency by the end of 3rd grade.



The Big 3 for High School Dropouts:

- 3 Xs** more likely to be unemployed
- 3 Xs** as likely to live in poverty
- 3 Xs** less in earnings than B.A. degree holders

10% male high school dropouts are in jail or juvenile detention, compared to:
Less than 3% of high school graduates
Less than .2% of college graduates

"Texas Families Exhibit 'Overwhelming' School Choice Demand" by Rachel Sheffield

Texas parents' demand for school choice is "overwhelming" and continues to grow even as their options expand, says Matthew Barnes. As executive director of the Houston-based Families Empowered, Barnes spends his days helping thousands of individual families find the best school fit for their children among private, charter, and district options. "It's really a function of every parent wanting to have the best opportunity for their child," he says, though Families Empowered surveys indicate many parents don't know about their options.

At the same time, many more families want options than have them: The waiting list for Texas charter schools tops 101,000 students, according to David Dunn, executive director of the Texas Charter Schools Association. Two years ago, that number was approximately 56,000.

Texas currently offers no private school choice, but Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst announced in August he would work with state legislators to introduce voucher legislation.

In August, the state's Senate Education Committee held a hearing that discussed Taxpayer Savings Grants—a voucher that would grant families up to 60 percent of state per-pupil education funding, or \$5,400.

Why Parents Want Choice

A recent Families Empowered survey found various reasons why families were not satisfied with their current school and wanted another. The most common response was a lack of academic quality, at 37.2 percent. Others cited problems with school personnel (14.8 percent) and security, safety and/or discipline problems (10.4 percent). Nearly 18 percent said they did not necessarily know why they were trying to leave their current school.

"They know there's something better," Barnes noted.

Families Empowered aims to help families navigate school options to help kids stay college-bound, using three main strategies, Barnes said: helping families find a good school fit, helping parents learn to advocate for their [children's] education needs, and teaching families to support their children's education at home. "Demand continues to far outpace supply," Dunn said.

Private Vouchers Available

Independent organizations provide private school scholarships in Texas. The STAR Sponsorship Program (SSP), which began in 1993, is one. They have also seen significant demand for choice. In 1999, the organization awarded approximately 500 scholarships, for which well over 9,000 families applied, said Patty Myers, its executive director. The group has disbursed more than \$4 million in scholarships to more than 3,400 kids since 1993.

To receive SSP scholarships, students must be eligible for federal school lunch subsidies by living in low-income households, she said. "We ask the children to work toward exemplary behavior," she said; recipients must commit to finishing homework, attending class on time, and maintaining high grades. Myers says people in her organization have been amazed at the high quality of students in the program.

"What has been extremely exciting is to witness the parents that are coming in," she said. Although she calls SSP a smaller organization, "somehow [parents] seem to find us."

Texas families are hungry for choice, Barnes said. "If parents learn of their options, there will be a tidal wave of parents pursuing the best option for their child," he said.
