**School Choice Benefits Economy**

In a June 7 article in Investors' Business Daily, Lewis Andrews stated, "There is growing evidence to suggest that widespread adoption of school choice would have a dramatic economic, as well as educational benefit." The Yankee Institute, conducting a study based on the fact that private education spends about \$2200 less per student than public school, found that educating all 47.5 million public school students privately would save more money than the annual total of all state budget deficits. The relief to middle-income families who struggle to live in high priced neighborhoods to access better schools would further stimulate the economy. Also, as a voucher system would sever "the link between school qualification and residential location," parents would have the incentive to move into declining urban areas and renovate them. In the long term, urban revitalization could lead to higher property values and a broader tax base. As Andrews concludes, "giving parents control over the education of their children is not just sound pedagogy-it's pretty good economics, too."
